The Town continues to make improvements in priority areas such as connectivity, economic development, public safety, and the overall quality of life in Speedway.




FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT

2024 PROPERTY TAX RATES GO DOWN AS ASSESSED VALUES GO UP AND DEBT PAYMENTS DECREASE

The State of Indiana sets the maximum levy (the dollar amount of property taxes that can be collected) for a town in a year, but certain debt funds are exempt from the maximum. Tax rates are tied to assessed values and the levy. This year the biggest factors leading to the lower tax rate are higher assessed values and lower debt payments, including the retirement of debt service on the 2013 street improvement bond.

*Does not include the redevelopment commission or separate taxing units (school, library, and public transportation board.)



OTHER REVENUE SOURCES:

Local income taxes, excise taxes, and various other tax distributions provide additional funding for the general fund, the street department, and parks. The Town's utilities are largely funded by user fees and charges.



COMPREHENSIVE PLAN

A comprehensive plan is a strategic outline of what the community wants to accomplish in the future. It acts as a guide for the growth and development of Speedway over the next 20 years, providing a foundation for decision-making on such topics as public services and infrastructure management. It is designed to aid communities in assessing assets and identifying opportunities to address current needs in the areas of land use, government capacity, public services, placemaking, economic development, housing, transportation, agriculture, natural resources, broadband access, and historic resources.

The planning process for the Town of Speedway Comprehensive Plan began in March 2022, and was funded in part through a \$60,000 Indiana Office of Community and Rural Affairs planning grant.

During the planning process, top priorities were identified, goals were outlined, strategies were discussed, and a community vision was created. To ensure that the planning process incorporated the ideas, concerns, and desires of the community, the planning process included public engagement

opportunities February - September in the form of public events, open houses, conversations with community stakeholders, and online surveys. The process was overseen by a Review Team and a Project Team comprised of community leaders, local business owners, healthcare providers, schools, major employers, organizations, and Speedway residents.

A public hearing was held August 14, 2023, to discuss the proposed comprehensive plan and public comments were invited to be heard. At this meeting, the Plan Commission certified that the Town of Speedway Comprehensive Plan met the necessary requirements in state statutes.

On August 28, 2023, Speedway Town Council adopted the Town of Speedway Comprehensive Plan in the Resolution No. 2023-05B.

This plan seeks to enhance and propel Speedway into the next 20 years through the following goals:

Offer multiple housing options that are safe, well-maintained, and economical for people of varying incomes, ages, and stages of life.



PUBLIC SAFETY

SPEEDWAY POLICE DEPARTMENT

The Speedway Police Department proudly serves the Town of Speedway providing 24-hour protective service to the Speedway community. SPD is committed to maintaining quality and professional police services to ensure the safety and security of the residents and businesses.

WHAT HAPPENED IN 2023

- Implemented twelve-hour shift schedules for Operations Division.
- Implemented ten-hour shift schedules for Investigations Division.
- Increased minimum of patrol officers to four officers per shift.
- Increased reserve officers to seven officers.
- Successfully managed police planning and response for traffic, security, and safety for May racing events and Brickyard 200.
- Installed ten FLOCK ALPR cameras for added traffic and criminal enforcement.
- Increased traffic enforcement efforts issued 34.7% more traffic citations and 20.5% more traffic warning citations.

SPEEDWAY STREET DEPARTMENT

The Speedway Street Department provides the community a wealth of services including keeping the Town clean & beautiful and maintaining roadways and infrastructure.

WHAT HAPPENED IN 2023

- Received \$417,522.00 in CCMG money for 2022 Asphalt Project that included new curbs, new sidewalks, driveway approaches and street resurfacing for North Whitcomb Ave., Hickorywood Ct, and Dr., Macarthur Lane, and a large portion of Patton.
- Applied for \$1,000,000.00 CCMG money for 2023 Asphalt Project .
- Purchased Ford F-150 pickup for Streets.
- Worked with Transportation Committee for the completion of sidewalk project in the amount of \$280,480.28 and installation of new Radar Speed Limit Signs.
- Worked with SRC on the 1300 Block Project and Gateway Sign Project.



STREET DEPARTMENT GOALS FOR 2024

- Complete 2023 Asphalt project estimated to cost 2.2 million dollars including new curbs, new sidewalks, driveway approaches and street resurfacing on Beauport Rd., Maplewood Dr., Hollister Dr. from Patton Dr. to Moller Rd., Hickorywood Dr. from Parkwood to High School Rd.
- Continue working with Speedway Transportation Committee and SRC on any ongoing and future projects including all new Radar Speed Limit Signs.
- Purchasing of RC mower for all dangerous mowing inclines to eliminate the cost of renting special equipment and for the safety of personnel.
- Purchasing of new Asphalt Roller, sharing cost with the Water Department.
- Purchasing a Hilti Core machine for the replacement of street signs to eliminate the cost of each rental.
- Continue to maintain and serve the Town Residents with all Street Department duties.

SPEEDWAY WATER WORKS

Water Works for the Town of Speedway is committed to enhancing water quality, keeping rates affordable, making continuous improvements to the drinking water system, and ensuring the Town of Speedway residents and businesses have sufficient water supplies for future generations.

WHAT HAPPENED IN 2023

- Replaced old water meters and added radio heads to meters.
- Replaced old broken valves to the distribution and water plant.
- New fluoride pump and one rebuilt pump.
- New loss of head gauge installed at ground plant.
- Added cell modems to all the wells and ground water plant.
- Intake structure for raw water pumps was added for the surface treatment plant to protect equipment. from the elements and to improve security and access to raw water supply.
- New garage for storage was completed and will help keep things protected from the elements.
- New lock and camera system installed for improved security.
- Received \$20,000 grant from the IFA and hired consultant to perform inventory of known lead service lines.



WATER WORKS GOALS FOR **2024**

- Continue to update and improve distribution system per Capital Improvement Plan.
- Replace old dump truck for distribution.
- Continue to update and improve both surface treatment and ground water plant buildings.
- Continue to use the surface plants as much as possible as to replenish wells.
- Continue to update and improve well sites.

SPEEDWAY WASTEWATER & STORM WATER

The Wastewater Department is responsible for the collection and treatment of wastewater generated by residential, commercial, and industrial users. Our goal is to protect human health and the environment while providing wastewater treatment service as efficiently as possible.

WHAT HAPPENED IN 2023

- Fully staffed WWTP operations.
- Adjusted final clarifiers flow for better settling to eliminate use of polymer in final clarifiers.
- Added a weir wolf to the No. 2 clarifier for better water quality and safety for employees.
- Replaced valves in the Return building.
- Three new certified operators at the WWTP.
 Two Class IV and one Class III. Currently five certified operators.
- Satisfactory rating on IDEM inspection.
- Closed Hampton Inn and Valvoline storm water Pollution Prevention Plans (SWPPP).
- Researching turning methane gas into an energy savings for the plant.



WASTEWATER & STORM WATER GOALS **2024**

- Additional certified operators at the plant.
- Replace the old grit classifier for improved grit removal.
- Approving Allison Transmission's new pre-treatment plant to achieve better water quality to the WWTP.
- Add another weir wolf to the No.3 final clarifier.
- Replace the burner on the digester boiler for better operation and efficiency.
- Continuing education for both wastewater and storm water.
- More valve replacement in the Return building.
- Creating an SOP for Total Nitrogen removal in the plant's lab.
- Meeting NPDES parameters at the plants, while maintaining zero violations.
- Research energy saving options such as solar power for the plant.


Human Resources facilitates hiring, administers employee benefits, and provides other employee-related resources for the Town of Speedway.
